### In-Gatherings benefit Lutheran World Relief

When you get determined, serviceminded women together, anything is possible.

In past decades, women in ELCA congregations in the Central States Synod have made and donated hundreds of quilts, health, and school kits to Lutheran World Relief (LWR). Earlier this year, there was not a scheduled collection site anywhere in Missouri. However, the Holy Spirit used friendly conversations to facilitate ministry in action.

The **St. Louis area In-Gathering** was hosted by partners of Shepard of the Hills church in Saint Ann, MO and St. Mark's church in Clayton, MO. Rev. Kristen Koch,

minister at Shepard of the Hills, offered the church grounds with a circular drive and convenient access to I-70 as the collection site. Eunice Halverson with St. Mark's coordinated the event with LWR organizers and recruited volunteers.

The **Mid-Missouri In-Gathering** was hosted by Our Savior's Church, Jefferson City, MO under the leadership of Gloria Sharp. Two weeks later Sharp and her husband drove a U-Haul vehicle to St. Louis, MO which was loaded with boxes from 11 churches. Donations also were collected to help cover shipping costs. The boxes were added to the semi-diesel truck bound for St. Paul, MN.

The Missouri In-Gatherings collected 1,335 quilts; 670 health kits; 634 school kits; 167 baby kits; and 45 sewing kits.

The Wichita In-Gathering was hosted by and held at Christ Lutheran in Wichita, KS. This was the first time an ELCA church in that area had participated.

Stops were made in Hays, KS and Salina, KS before arriving in Wichita. Ten churches participated at the Wichita site. In Salina, 25 churches from North Central and Northeastern Kansas sent quilts, personal care, baby, sewing, and school kits. In total 11,619 pounds of items were sent on to LWR in Minneapolis. Another ingathering is planned for 2023 in Salina and they are encouraging other churches to join them in becoming ingathering sites.

#### We are called to make disciples

During our CSS WELCA convention, we learned about discipleship making. I quoted author Justin Gravitt whose blogs and writings I regularly follow. I continue to understand how I can be a true disciple of Christ and how I can make disciples of Christ. Justin says, "A skilled disciple maker is called to build into the life of each person." This caught my attention.

Who is a skilled disciple? Do we need skills to be a disciple or make disciples? We know the disciples Jesus called were not skilled to make disciples. They were normal folks like you and me. In answer to the question, "Are we called to make disciples?" I think the answer is a big YES. The great commission the Lord gave us affirms our call. "Go and make disciples." (Matthew 28: 19-20)

I gave many excuses when the Lord called me to pastoral ministry. I said: "I am not called to do that or this. I am called to be a scientist, trained, and achieved higher education to do that." Excuses and excuses. However, in the end, I heard and followed. "Come follow me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Matthew 4:19).

The offer is to be made into something (a disciple) and Jesus is the maker. I obeyed and submitted to His call. Immediately, the transformation began, and I change and grow every day. Jesus' method of making me his disciple began with transformation and teaching, not just theological education. He is teaching me to love like he loved, forgive like he forgives and build relationships by building into the life of people whom I encounter in daily life.

A call to make disciples is costly, emphasized Justin. I experienced that in my life as a leader in the church. I experienced humiliation and rejection. However, I learned, a true disciple or disciple making demands genuine growth toward maturity, a perseverance to overcome obstacles, and a belief that God wants to use you.

My dear sisters in Christ, as we enter another year, I want to challenge you and remind you of the CALL we are given. Our purpose statement of WELCA calls us to discipleship.

How are we fulfilling that CALL? How are we investing our time and talents to build strong relationships with each other as well as in the community we live in? How are we spreading love, forgiveness, and compassion towards those whom we cannot agree with? The Apostle Paul taught the Romans, "Let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armor of light" (Romans 13:12).

Are we ready to put on the armor of light? To be light of the world as the Lord called us to be?

"If you are a disciple, not only are you called to make disciples, you have been given everything you need to succeed" (Justin Gravitt).

- 3. Award is a 1-year non-renewable scholarship.
- 4. Scholarship monies are written to and sent directly to the educational institution you are attending.
- 5. Must include with this application a written recommendation and signature from your Pastor, mentor, unit president or unit representative. Recommendation cannot come from a current or previous board member (within last four years).
- 6. Must include an essay of approximately 500 words describing your participation in church, school, and community activities.
- 7. Award recipients will be notified in April 2023.
- 8. Award recipients will be asked to forward a photo electronically that will be used in synodical organization publications.
- 9. Award recipients will be strongly encouraged to attend dinner on Saturday evening of the annual convention of the Central States Women of the ELCA—June 24, 2023 at Stoney Creek Hotel Kansas City-Independence.
- 10. Individual awards will not exceed \$1,000. Multiple awards may be given in a year.
- 11. In the event that your college is undecided at the time the award is announced, it will be your responsibility to keep the CSS Board Treasurer, Janice Gerken, informed of your selection at janicegerken@aol.com.
- 12. Application must be postmarked by March 1, 2023.
